Defense the key for USPBL catcher's big-league dream

Whit Hughes' goal of moving higher in his craft will depend in part on how low he can go.

The catcher starts his third season with the USPBL Eastside Diamond Hoppers later this week, and he's trying to catch on with a major-league organization or win the Utica-based league's championship.

"Obviously, everybody in the league wants to put up numbers and get signed," the former St. Clair County Community College player said Tuesday. "If that doesn't happen, the secondary goal will be to put up numbers and win a ring.

"We came close last year."

Eastside went 23-21 in 2023, the second-best record in the four-team USPBL.

The Diamond Hoppers open with a doubleheader against Birmingham Bloomfield at Jimmy John's Field on Saturday, a day after defending champion Utica plays the Westside Woolly Mammoths to start the USPBL's ninth season.

"We're looking forward to it," third-year Eastside manager Ryan Kottke said. "We've got a lot of new faces on our roster."

Utica defeated the Woolly Mammoths in the 2023 championship game. It was the third title in four years for the Unicorns, who are managed by former big-league catcher Jim Essian.

Alex Garbacik, a Westside infielder who's moving from third base to shortstop, is eager for the first pitch Friday. "The atmosphere here on game days is awesome," he said. "I think Friday nights are my favorite."

Hughes caught from the traditional catcher's crouch when he played at Yale High and SC4. When he signed with the Diamond Hoppers three years ago, John Dombrowski, the current Birmingham Bloomfield manager who's nicknamed "Diesel" and is known as the USPBL catching guru, had advice for him.

"He said, 'You've got to start being on a knee a little more, because the difference between pitchers at this level and college is that their misses are not as big," Hughes said.

"All through college, I was always the traditional two feet, blocking-comes-first type of guy. Here, blocking isn't as much of a priority as receiving and trying to steal strikes. I've adapted my game. I'm more of a one-knee-down guy now."

The 6-foot-5 Hughes is taller than a lot of professional catchers.

"Honestly, it helps me," he said of the knee-on-ground crouch that's popular in the pro ranks. "Being so tall, it helps my knees a little bit.

"I don't have the stress of being on two feet. The knees don't take as much of a beating."

Hughes was concerned that his ability to block wild pitches would suffer even though he was lower to the ground when he got on one knee.

"Diesel said, 'Listen, the guys who are throwing here are not going to be missing bad.' The more I learned about it, the better I got. I got to where I could block comfortably."

Hughes batted .186 with three home runs and nine RBIs last year.

He and Sterling Heights native Kottke ran an offseason hitting school, and both player and manager worked on Hughes' swing. "Everybody's swing has got holes," Hughes said. "Our job is to try to minimize those. We changed some things with the swing, got it in a good spot."

A batter's weakness isn't a secret for long in the USPBL, Hughes said.

"A month into the season and everybody knows everybody," he said. "The pitchers have a good idea how to get hitters out. "They're good. This is no joke. This is a lower-end league, but at the same time the talent is pretty legit. If a pitcher's got good stuff, he'll expose you. It's all about trying to eliminate those holes."

More than 50 USPBL players have signed with Major League Baseball organizations. The most recent was Utica right-hander Andrew Huffman, who signed with the Minnesota Twins last week.

Hughes said his chances of following Huffman to an MLB system depend on his defense.

"My job is primarily to get dirty (behind the plate)," he said. "If I find consistent (bat) barrels, as a catcher that's all I can ask for. I'm not trying to hit for power. I'm not trying to hit for a high average.

"(Teams) are not looking for a dude who's an average catcher and hits a (home run) every night. They want a dude who's going to manage a pitching staff, protect the baseball and find a barrel every now and then. I pride myself on being able to manage a staff well."

The Utica/Westside game starts at 7:05 p.m. and will be followed by a fireworks show. The first game of the Eastside/Birmingham Bloomfield doubleheader starts at 5:30 p.m.
